

Easter Sunday, Year "A" – Jesus Is Alive Forever, Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia.

Today is Easter Sunday. I wish all of you my beloved parishioners a joyful and glorious Easter celebration.

Peace be with you. Today is a joyful day. Jesus is used to making this day joyful for us, but today, God wants us to make it joyful for Jesus. The coronavirus continues to cause untold havoc in the world. Our hope is that the risen Lord will save us from this moment of terror. As the faith of the apostles was vindicated more than 2000 years ago, so we believe that it will be vindicated again.

My prayer is that this Easter Sunday will mark a radical turning point in our struggle to overcome the ravaging effects of the COVID-19 pandemic which has changed, if not destroyed, the world as we used to know it. May the new world that begins with the resurrection of Jesus restore order, purpose, and meaning to our lives again. We pray that the coronavirus becomes a thing of the past, and the children of God may begin to enjoy the peace which only God can give.

We are the Easter people. We have every reason to believe that the reign of love has begun. We shall not die; we shall live to sing the praises of the risen and glorified Lord, who calls us out of darkness into His wonderful light.

All who believe in the resurrection should weep no more. Let's celebrate for Jesus has conquered the world, even death could not hold Him. As Jesus lives to die no more, so all who believe in Him shall rise from the scourge of the coronavirus to live for the greater glory of God forever. Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia. Amen.
